BAPTISM: Sundays at 12:30 pm preceded by instruction for the parents and godparents. Please call the rectory to register for classes.

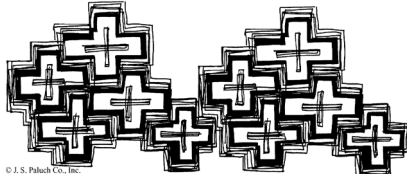
MARRIAGE: Arrangements for the marriage preparation program must be made at least six months prior to the date of marriage. Call the Rectory for an appointment.

FROM THE PASTOR

In a war of ethnic cleansing, a young mother was murdered, leaving behind her husband and their only boy. The man traveled far and wide looking for work while his son stayed with relatives. After a long absence, the father came home only to find his village destroyed and all his friends gone. He searched the rubble and found some small bones. He believed they were the remains of his little son. He wrapped them carefully in a cloth and carried them with him where ever he went.

Years passed, and one night the old man heard a knock at his door, "Who's there?" he called out.

"It's me, your son!" came the reply. "I was kidnapped and escaped, and I've spent years looking for you."

"You vicious imposter!" yelled the old man. "My son is dead. Leave me alone!" And he refused to open the door.

The pounding continued for a long time, but finally it stopped and the son – for that is who it was – went away. The old man wept – as he did every night – hugging his bag of old dry bones.

All he had to do was put down the bag and open the door. In our Gospel this weekend Jesus sends out his disciples and tells them to travel light. Not to take with them anything that would steal the life out of them. They are beginning something new.

Jesus came to set us free. He will do that if only we let go of whatever is robbing us of life. We have to let go of our own little bag of bones and open the door.

Our savior knocks at the door and asks us to let go of the fears, the hates, the sorrows, the unhealthy attitudes we nourish.

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time False Humility?

It's been months since Easter and it's a long way to Christmas, but there seems to be a lot of rejoicing in today's readings. Isaiah talks about rejoicing with Jerusalem. The Gospel shows the disciples rejoicing when they came back from visiting towns to tell about the Kingdom. St. Paul is happy to be suffering for Christ. So what is the reason for such joy?

The readings make clear that it is not because of what the people of Jerusalem did, or even what miracles Jesus' disciples performed. Isaiah talks about what God will do for the people, how "the LORD's power shall be known to his servants" (Isaiah 66:14). Jesus tells his disciples not to rejoice that they cast out demons; no, they should "rejoice because your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10:20). In other words, we are to rejoice over all the Lord has done for us, not what we have done for him.

Does that sound like false humility? Like someone receiving an Oscar who says, "I wasn't that good--it was all that my director, my producers, my wife and children, and my dog Snoopy did." No, when we do anything for others, we can honestly say that God does the real work. Knowing that frees us from expecting everyone to be happy, everything we do for others to be successful. When our offer of help is rejected, our prayers for a sick friend don't seem to be working, or our good advice is ridiculed, we can be confident that God has something else planned. Instead of being discouraged, we can trust that God's plan is working in ways we just can't see.

Paul has a similar theme in the second reading. You would think he would be proud of all the converts he made or the people he cured. He boasts only about his suffering because that is how he is most like Jesus. He sees all of his accomplishments as the work of God, and he knows that the greatest thing Jesus did was to die for us. All three readings remind us that what changes our lives and changes the world is not how hard we work or how holy we are; what really makes the difference is how much God loves us. That is the real reason to rejoice.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's high summer now, school is out, the pace of work slows, and some people drift away. There are visitors in the churches every summer, and familiar faces are "among the missing." Some find the summer's call more appealing than the summons of the church bells. Many, however, would not dream of missing a Sunday, and so they make their way to Mass in unfamiliar places, watching the locals for clues as to when to sit or stand, where the Communion stations are. In answering the call, they keep the "sabbatical" rhythm of the Christian life: every seventh day, the Body of Christ assembles for worship.

For centuries, there was no obligation to Sunday Mass in the sense of a written law, but Christians have always yearned to be together on Sunday. In the city of Abitina, during a persecution by the Emperor Diocletian, a group of Christians were urged to stop worshipping together on Sundays. They responded, "Then take our lives, for without the Sunday we cannot live." By a curious coincidence, the appointed readings today center us on thoughts of peace. On our Independence Day, the experience of worship situated us in community, and evoked a commitment from us to be advocates of peace in all aspects of our society's life.
