**BAPTISM:** Sundays at 12:30 pm preceded by instruction for the parents and godparents. Please call the rectory to register for classes.

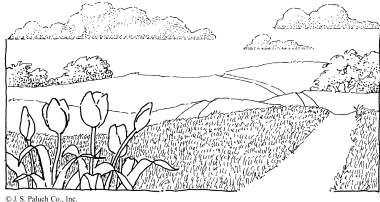
**MARRIAGE:** Arrangements for the marriage preparation program must be made at least six months prior to the date of marriage. Call the Rectory for an appointment.

# Third Sunday of Easter

## April 26, 2020

You have made known to me the paths of life;  
you will fill me with joy in your presence. — Acts 2:28

### FROM THE PASTOR

For over a month now, we have observed the order to stay at home, except for essential activities, in order to slow the spread of the coronavirus. We have obeyed the 'social distancing' regulations and now we even wear masks. All of this of course upsets the regular way of life we have been used to. People step off the pavement when you approach them for fear of the contagion. We cannot come together to celebrate the Eucharist. The virus is an ever present enemy that instills fear, loneliness and isolation.

Two disciples tried to distance themselves from the events that had happened in Jerusalem. They were lonely and sad. However they could not get Jesus out of their system.

A fellow traveler walked with them. He gave them an insight to what had happened "these past few days". It is an important message for all of us in times of change and difficulty; when we sit in seclusion, in fear of the coronavirus; when we walk alone wearing a mask, hiding our weariness, pain and solitude.

Jesus approached the two travelers without a mask but they didn't recognize him. The message of Emmaus is that Jesus walks with us on these paths of fear, sadness and an uncertain future.

The Risen Lord is with us and gives us food for the journey – his own body and blood.

Not all of us can be physically present to celebrate the Eucharist but in our sadness and deprivation Jesus accompanies us.

The Gospel tells us that before he fed them with his body, he fed them with his word and opened the scriptures to them. "Were not our hearts burning within while he spoke to us.....and opened the Scriptures to us"? Maybe today, read again this Gospel. Be one of the travelers on the road and listen to Jesus and the Scripture speaking to you.

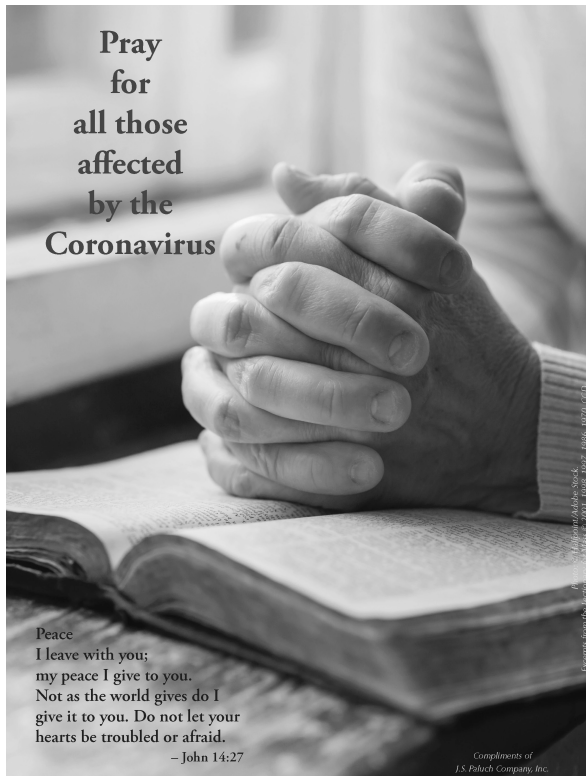
**Grocery Ministry Is Launched, Volunteers Are Needed**

The Archdiocese of San Francisco's Office of Human Life & Dignity (HLD) has launched a "Love Your Neighbor" initiative to help those who are homebound and in need of groceries during the COVID-19 shelter-in-place. On the webpage Love Your Neighbor (above), those who need help can submit requests (online or by phone); those who want to give help can volunteer, online or by phone. The project launched on April 2, and Archbishop Cordileone sent a personal message to pastors urging them to participate in making the project a success.

Funding is available to Catholic groups who establish short-term grocery-buying and delivery ministries during the pandemic. These ministries will provide groceries, without charge, for those in financial need. In addition, they will do shopping and delivery for those who have funds to buy groceries but are homebound because of COVID-19 health concerns.

### **Third Sunday of Easter Emmaus Amazement**

Today's Gospel has some surprises for the disciples going to Emmaus. The first is that Luke tells us Jesus appeared to them, "but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him" (Luke 24:16). Now I don't think Jesus was wearing glasses like Clark Kent. More likely, they were prevented by their lack of faith. They knew that Jesus had died, so this man who looked familiar couldn't be him. All they had heard was that Jesus' body was missing from the tomb. Luke says they were debating, as if they couldn't decide what to believe.

That leads to the second point. No, they were not surprised that the stranger could quote scripture. Most Jewish men were familiar with the scriptures, but they were amazed at how Jesus explained them. Even the disciples had not thought of them as predicting Jesus' suffering and death. Yet they seem to know the truth of what Jesus was saying. Their hearts were burning with the fire of the Holy Spirit, who helped them to understand the new meaning of scripture. Their story can help us, too.

If you find you are not always able to see Jesus in the people or events of your life, you may need to stretch your faith. One way to do that is to discuss it with others. The two disciples were stretching their faith as they discussed what they had heard. Even better, debate it with someone who doesn't believe. (Remember to keep it friendly.) You may not convince them to change, but your faith will grow as you learn to express it. Another way to stretch your faith is to read and pray over the scriptures. Ask what God is trying to tell you in them. The disciples on the way to Emmaus began to see how Jesus fulfilled the promises found there. Passages that may have been mysterious before began to become clear when applied to Jesus.

Ask God to help you see Jesus in other people. Receive Jesus in Communion as often as you can (at least once a week). Trust him and expect to see Jesus both in the people around you and in the changes that come into your life. The more you look for Jesus, the easier it is to see him.

### **TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

"Mystagogy," reflection on the Easter mysteries, is the chief task of these great fifty days, a "pentecost," in other words, of grace and renewal. Every Sunday we have accounts of Resurrection appearances of the Lord, and sketches of the earliest efforts at being church.

Lent is described as a journey to the font, and Easter may be described in similar terms, since at the very beginning an angel tells the apostles that the Risen Lord "has gone before you into Galilee." Galilee, of course, was the place where Jesus did his finest work, his preaching, his healing, his gathering the lost and the marginalized to the table. At Easter, we hurry to catch up, putting our renewed baptismal promises to work in our own personal Galilees, our little worlds waiting for a word of grace, a healing, an act of pardon, an invitation to share a meal. The water often splashed on our Sunday assemblies in Eastertide reminds us: these are the golden, shining days of grace, days to nurture the heart, to speak to one another about things that really matter. —James Field, Copyright © J.
