FROM THE PASTOR...

A year ago at Christmas, I received a present of a pair of socks. On them was printed, "Selective Hearing Expert." In a world awash with chatter, we tend only to listen to the messages we want to hear and filter out the rest. That is why I like the story about Franklin Roosevelt. He often endured long receiving lines at the White House. One day, during a reception, he decided to try an experiment. To each person who passed down the line and shook his hand, he murmured,

"I murdered my grandmother this morning." The guests responded with phrases like "Marvelous! Keep up the good work. We are proud of you. God bless you, sir." It was not till the end of the line, while greeting the ambassador from Bolivia, that his words were actually heard. Nonplussed the ambassador leaned over and whispered, "I'm sure she had it coming."

Samuel, in the first reading had to listen and discern who was calling him. So also the disciple were given time to listen and discern when invited by Jesus: "Come, and you will see.....they stayed with him that day."

The disciple may have been simple fishermen but they possessed the singular gift of being open to something new. Their minds were not closed. It took courage to listen to something different than what they heard all their life from family and friends. The authorities believed Jesus was a misguided troublemaker and closed their minds. Their hearts were stony! What Jesus was teaching was not merely for the head but the heart. He wasn't presenting arguments to convince but stories to change. His is a kingdom not of this world but of the heart. Maybe today we need the courage to turn down the volume of our own righteousness and listen to others with a sensitive heart.

Archbishop Requests Participation in Day of Prayer for Legal Protection of the Unborn

Dear Faithful People of God of the Archdiocese of San Francisco, please join with me to pray and to do penance on January 22, the day that the U.S. bishops have designated the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children."

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, no. 373, states: 'In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22 (or January 23, when January 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion.'

The 1973 *Roe v. Wade* decision is a harsh marker of the 'throwaway culture' that Pope Francis decries. There have been more than 56 million abortions since *Roe v. Wade*. It is unimaginable that so many little human lives have been lost or to envision the tremendous damage inflicted upon the children's mothers, fathers and families.

In Scripture, God calls us over and over again to pray and repeatedly reminds us that he will answer our prayers. On this day, we call on him particularly to remedy this great evil. I will be offering the Mass at noon at the Cathedral of St. Mary of the Assumption on January 22. The Mass will also be live-streamed.

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Hello, God

Just before our first reading it says that "the word of the LORD was rare; there were not many visions." (1Sam 3:1) I imagine most people today would think that was true. Haven't you ever wished you lived in biblical times, to see some of the miracles you read about? Wouldn't it be cool to hear the LORD speaking in a vision? Do you think God has stopped talking? People apparently felt that way in Samuel's time. Let's look at the reading to see what Samuel's experience can teach us.

At first Samuel thinks it is Eli calling him. It is not unusual for people to miss a sign from God. If you have a talent that you are proud of, perhaps it is a sign that God wants you to use that talent to help others. Or if a friend tells you she is concerned about your health, it could be God's way of telling you to get help. Try to see God speaking in whatever happens to you and you may hear a lot more than you think.

Samuel also gets help from Eli. Eli began to recognize that the LORD was speaking to Samuel. Sometimes we need help discerning what the Lord is telling us. A good spiritual director can lead you to understand what God is saying to you. Your pastor may be able to do that, or at least able to refer you to someone.

Warning: A spiritual director will probably ask how often you pray. In our reading Samuel finally speaks directly to God, instead of going back to Eli. Then God tells him what God's plan was. So if you wonder what God plans for your life, try spending more time in prayer with him. Don't be like the man who complains he never know what his wife wants from him. When asked what she tells him, he says, "I don't know; we never talk." I bet we have all had times where we didn't know if we are doing God's will because we didn't take time to pray. But don't do all the talking. Give God some quiet time to hear his response. For God hasn't stopped talking; we just stopped listening. -Tom Schmidt, Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Valentine's cards have appeared at the shopping mall, but in the Every year, close to the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on January 25, and before the feast of the Chair of St. Peter on February 22, the cause of Church unity is commended to Christians everywhere. Sadly, Protestants, Orthodox, and Catholics have settled to a status quo of separation. When baptized people become Catholic, we speak of them as being received into "full communion." That means we already share a communion in faith in many ways, including the Word of God. Many Protestant denominations have received and revised the three-year cycle of readings first arranged by Catholics in the early 1970s. Therefore, many of your neighbors who are not Catholic are celebrating and reflecting on the same readings we are savoring on most Sundays of the year. This makes for a new spirit of cooperation among preachers of the gospel, and gives hope that the cause of reunion, desired by Christ, has great vitality at the table of God's Word, and will one day lead to unity at the table of the Lord's Body and Blood.
