God so loved the world that he gave his only Son. — John 3:16a

FROM THE PASTOR

An angel appears at a faculty meeting and tells the dean that in return for his unselfish and exemplary behavior, the Lord will reward him with his choice of infinite wealth, wisdom or beauty. Without hesitating, the dean selects infinite wisdom.

"Done!" says the angel, and disappears in a cloud of smoke and a bolt of lightning. Now, all heads turn toward the dean, who sits surrounded by a faint halo of light. At length, one of his colleagues whispers, "Say something."

The dean looks at them and says, "I should have taken the money."

We think small most of the time. And it is never more obvious than when we are thinking about God. We imagine God to be like someone we already know. We make God into a Policeman, or God the Sweet Old Guy with a long beard, or God the Absentee Landlord, and so on. The feast of the Trinity is aimed at getting our image straight.

God is a relationship, a community of Father, Son and Spirit. God is "we" and not "I". The God revealed to us does not "do" love; God is love.

We are surrounded and enfolded in this relationship. In this mystery 'we live and move and have our being.' When we come to church we usually make the sign of the cross and pray the words that accompany this holy action, "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit". This simple prayer reminds us that there are three persons in God. It also calls to mind that when we first entered the Church we were baptized in the same Holy Trinity. We belong to the family of God; we are members of His household, co-heirs with Christ, anointed with the Holy Spirit. We live in the mystery of Trinity. "Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning is now and ever shall be world without end. Amen" -Fr. Joe

State Issues Guidelines for Church Reopenings with Local Approval

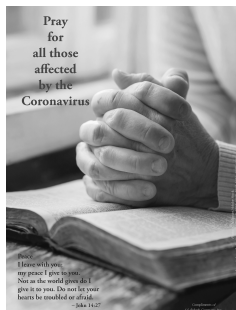

On March 25, Governor Newsom announced the church services in the state could resume, within guidelines to protect the health and safety of attendees and according to local health department guidelines. The state's document is available at the link above. At the time of this publication, the health departments of the three counties that comprise the Archdiocese (San Mateo, San Francisco, and Marin) are still advising that gatherings of groups of people, including in churches, not occur. Mayor Breed has announced an anticipated reopening date in San Francisco of June 15, pending public health developments between now and then.

The Archdiocese is communicating with the health departments of these counties. The Archbishop consults regularly with his fellow California bishops and many other advisors, to determine when and how to return to services in our churches while maintaining safe distancing and other necessary protocols. That information will be made available as soon as possible, via our website, sfarch.org, and our social media channels (easily accessible via the icons at the top of the website).

The Most Holy Trinity

Life, the Universe, and Everything

Why does God love us so much? And why are we able to love others? The answer to these questions is found in the meaning of today's feast. Trinity Sunday celebrates not so much an idea of three-in-one as the relationship of the Persons of the Trinity with each other and with us.

The idea is that the Father expressed himself as the Word. Since it was a perfect expression, the Word is his Son and equal to the Father. The love of Father and Son is expressed as the Holy Spirit. Being a perfect love, it too is equal to Father and Son. So even the idea of the Trinity is based on love. But God's love was so great, God went even further. God created us to be loved by God.

In the second reading Paul blesses the Corinthians with the "love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit." The book of Genesis (3:18) says that it was not good for man to be alone. So God created woman, and through man and woman all humanity, to be able to love each other. Though human love is not perfect, the love of man and woman can produce another person, a child. The three Persons of the Trinity share one life in God. But through baptism, we also share in God's life. Just as parents love to see how their children look like them, so God loves to see the divine in us.

The first reading reminds us of God's closeness to humanity. Moses can speak to God and God responds by granting his request. The Gospel tells how much God loves the world, that God's own Son was sent to die for us. But we sometimes forget that God's love comes first. We think that the more loving we are, the more God will love us. But love comes from God (1 John 4:7-11), so when we love someone it doesn't make God love us more; we love because God loves us first. Our decision to love is a response to God's love, and our ability to love is itself a gift from God. The meaning of life, the universe, and everything is Love, the love of the Trinity for each other and for us. The question now is, how well do we use that gift of God's love by loving each other?

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The liturgy seems reluctant to return to Ordinary Time from the joys of Easter, and so the festivities extend to today's celebration of the mystery of God's relationship to us as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The Gospel today centers the question of our relationship with God in the struggle of Nathaniel to believe that it is possible to experience "rebirth" in the Spirit. The answer of Jesus is that God's response to the messes of this world is the mystery of saving love in Jesus Christ and the outpouring of an empowering Spirit.

Western church architecture often tops a church building with a spire, indicating humanity's reach to a transcendent God. The Eastern Church responds with onion-shaped domes, indicating the Spirit's being poured down upon humanity precisely at this locale, the gathering of the faithful for the Divine Liturgy. This familiar design encodes a great mystery: here, at the Lord's table, we experience the outpouring of the Spirit for the life of the world. Nathaniel came to Jesus by night, since he was still working out the meaning of his life. A life attuned to the inner life of the Trinity must always be given to the light of day.
